New Display Celebrates Compelling Story of Beaver Entrepreneur Michael Baker, Jr.



The Beaver Area Heritage Museum's summer display honors Beaver entrepreneur Michael Baker, Jr., and the worldwide engineering firm he founded.

In 1940, at age 28, Michael Baker, Jr., opened his own surveying and

engineering business in the Penn-Beaver Hotel in Rochester, PA. The business grew from one \$25 lot survey to an eight-man operation grossing \$15,000 in its first year.

Always a visionary, he traveled the globe early in his career in search of his "favorite project – the next project." Through the Far East, Middle East, Europe and Latin America, he logged millions of travel miles.

Engineering Design - In 1951, the firm was named consulting engineer and construction administrator for Saudi Arabia. This entailed design of harbor facilities, customs buildings, major highway systems, airports, water supply and electrical systems, a private hospital for the royal family, a \$30 million air base and additions to the royal palaces.



Considered to be one of the great engineering and construction feats in history, the Trans-Alaska Pipeline was a crowning achievement for Baker during the late 1960s and into 1977, when it became operational. Upon completion, the \$7.7 billion project was the largest privately funded venture in history. The 48-

inch oil pipeline was designed to bring two million barrels of crude from Prudhoe Bay to Valdez.

The Baker-designed New River Gorge Bridge, in Fayetteville, WV, is an engineering marvel stretching 3,030 feet from one end to the other. With a main arch span of 1,700 feet, it is the longest single arch steel bridge in the world.

Public Works/Government Projects - Baker's work for the Department of Homeland Security's US-VISIT program keeps our borders safe. What started as a data collection and mapping task for 400 border air, land, and sea points-of-entry has evolved into Baker as an integral, overall program manager. Baker's services on behalf of the Department of Defense Dependents Schools began in 1988. Baker has helped detect and manage asbestos abatement at 1,000 facilities worldwide. Today, Baker serves the DoD Education Activity with critical planning, design, environmental and program management services.

The American Consulting Engineers Council honored Baker with its 1992 Grand Conceptor Award for the design of Vine Street Expressway in Philadelphia. This \$225 million, seven-year effort provided much needed relief for one of Pennsylvania's most congested highway corridors.

Baker was one of the first engineering companies to utilize computer technology for engineering purposes. Its first computer had less computing power than most handheld calculators of the 1980s.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has been a client for more than 30 years. In 2004, Baker embarked on its most challenging FEMA project yet -- the \$750 million modernization of the entire flood mapping system as FEMA's National Service Provider.

Elementary School Outreach Touches Hundreds of Students

Local school children are buzzing about the Heritage Museum's educational program that has enriched the social studies curriculum of more than 1,500 students since its inception in 2003. Partnering with the Beaver



Valley Intermediate Unit and local public and private schools to provide hands-on learning experiences, this program is no ordinary field trip. It was designed and is run primarily by former educators: Shirley Pow (Director of Gifted Education for Beaver Area); Art Cornell (Blackhawk School District Principal); and at least 10 others are retired teachers. Their collective experience ensures that the program satisfies National Standards for fifth, third and first grader curriculums. Other docents bring their backgrounds local business, and a love of children, to make Beaver's history come alive to our youngest generation.



Dutch Ridge fifth grade teacher Glenna Matthews says that the program augments what her class is learning about the colonial times. She points out that the history they are learning is more than just a story in a book — it is right here in our town. She says students are eager to return for more fun, interactive learning experiences. Students also share *History by Trolley* — the coloring/

activity book created by fifth graders – with first grade partners in the Book Buddy (reading mentorship) program.

College Square first grade teacher Mandi Mammone uses *History by Trolley* to highlight our hometown through pictures, activities and text, so the students can read and discuss the material. This primes children for their visit to the museum. Says Mammone, "Going to the museum is a great trip for the kids, and they truly enjoy it! They love getting to learn about what it was like to live back then."

The hands-on activities are engaging, each tailored to fit first, third or fifth grade learning levels and curriculum. At the museum, children go on scavenger hunts, learn about Beaver's Native American origins and make quilt patterns. In the log house, they churn butter, help make stew, toast or apple sauté at the hearth, plant herbs, measure trees, and learn how water was carried. They play period games like quoits and blind man's bluff, write period sayings with quill pens, learn about animal pelts and dress in period costume. Fifth graders go on a trolley tour narrated by Art Cornell, stopping for hands-on activities led by retired teacher Dolores Dowlin. Children come away with an enthusiasm they are eager to share with their families.

Complementing the program, Beaver's Summer Academy offers classes in colonial crafts, cooking, games and music. Riley Ivol, a sophomore in the Monaca School District, thought the colonial cooking class "sounded fun" five summers ago. Her experience in the Academy led her to become a Junior Docent at the museum, greeting visitors and answering questions. She and her friend Brenton Atcheson are future leaders in our community.

Retired teacher Helen Janicki says: "I like working with the kids and giving back to the community. In getting kids interested in history at a young age, we're planting a seed for their future interest." She says being a docent is "not at all laborious; we do it because we want to." The volunteer roster has risen from 25 to 30 in the past year.
